

Book title: If you Give A Dog a Donut

Activity #1:

Supplies for activities needed:

- Decorate Your Own Donut worksheet
- Coloring supplies
 - Crayons, markers, colored pencils, paint + brushes
- Extra paper to create shapes to add to donut
 - Specifically for sprinkles
- Scissors
- Glue / Tape

Activity Name: Decorate Your Own Donut

- School Readiness Outcomes (SRO) goals met:
 - Makes and expresses choices - the child is able to decorate their own donut to their liking.
 - Relates to adults - the child is working with a familiar adult to complete the activity of creating their donut.
 - Understanding speech - when an adult is asking questions, the child is expected to understand what they are saying.
- Instructions
 1. Watch the read-aloud of “If You Give A Dog A Donut”
 2. Allow the child to decorate their own donut!
 - a. Give child a blank donut worksheet + access to coloring/creating supplies to use
 3. As the adult, use the guided questions sheet to ask the child questions related to how they would decorate their donut

- Extension Activity Ideas

1. Let the child give a fun name to their donut (practice writing)
2. Have the child orally describe how they decorated their donut (strengthen speech production)

Activity #2:

Supplies for activities needed:

- coloring utensil of choice (markers, crayons)
- scissors
- glue stick or glue bottle or tape

Activity Name: Making Predictions

- School Readiness Outcomes (SRO) goals met:
 - Problem solving - The children are asked to identify what picture matches with each scenario after listening to the story and hearing the sequence of the book.
 - Making Choices - The children make choices by deciding how they want to color the pictures. They also make the decision on what picture correlates with each scenario based on their own predictions.
 - Beginning reading - This activity makes children focus specifically on the words in the text and makes them connect the words to the corresponding picture.
- Instructions
 1. The children will color the pictures at the bottom
 2. Once finished coloring, the child will cut out the photos
 3. Read the scenario and based on the book, make a prediction on what fits that situation
 4. Under each scenario, glue down the corresponding picture
- Extension Activity Ideas

1. If the child finishes early, they can attempt to write out the word that correlates with the picture in the given space. (practice writing)
